A MESSAGE FROM THE RABBI

Rabbi Brian P. Immerman

Judaism embraces a tradition of counting, from the number of days during creation to the number of Israelites who left Egypt, from

the number of commandments to the number of years we wandered in the wilderness. We are still in the wilderness, the uncertain and unknown expanse of COVID. While I pray that when you read this most of us will have received at least one dose of the vaccine, I know that we still cannot yet gather in person as we used to. As we have for the past 400 days, we look to our 4000 year old tradition for guidance.

From Passover to Shavuot, God commands us to count each day for a total of fifty days, called the omer. April 30th was the 33rd day of the Omer, called Lag B'omer, a day of special celebration. We learn in our Talmud (Yevamot 61b) that during the omer, over 1500 years ago, a plague afflicted Rabbi Akiva's students. As a result, some follow the tradition to refrain from cutting hair or shaving, mourning rituals for those who died. Legend teaches that on the 33rd day of the omer the plague lifted and we celebrate this time period with bonfires and rejoicing. During the past year many of us have let our hair grow longer, almost as if we are collectively mourning both those who have died and for what our lives were pre-pandemic. We are all patiently awaiting our own Lag B'omer, our day when this insidious plague will lift and we can rejoice in person again.

We can see hope on the horizon. Slowly, we are resuming in person activities at CMI. Students are becoming b'mitzvah in our sanctuary and reading from our Holocaust Torah scroll, outdoor services allow us to lift our voices in harmony once again, and we hope and pray it will be safe to re-enter our sacred spaces as a community this fall. For now, we continue to count.

Counting, the omer, the days of the week, month, year, and more allows us to both separate different time periods but also different stages in our lives. We might count and celebrate the number of years of our lives, how long we have worked at a specific place, the time we have spent with our beloveds, and we also count the years since we lost a loved one, that we have been afflicted with disease, or since a moment

that transformed our lives forever.

Judaism assures of us that our counting will come to an end. When we study history we see that our ancestors have suffered before us. We learn that suffering, even when it lasts longer than we may have initially anticipated, ends. We will one day, soon I pray, return and fill our sanctuary, our chapel, our religious school classrooms, our social halls, our library and lounge with praying, learning, singing, eating, and celebrating.

Each year our counting of the Omer and the retelling of the story of Rabbi Akiva reminds us that better days lie ahead. It will continue to take patience, courage, community and faith, but we will arrive at Sinai together. I look forward to continue seeing you both in person and online and I wish you all health, peace, courage and comfort as we count together.

The Hebrew words "gam zeh ya'avor", which in English translate to "this too shall pass", have been evoked

frequently for more than a year. We trace the origin of the phrase to the legends of King Solomon, who is traditionally portrayed as "wealthy and wise'. Scientists, clergy, politicians and other thought leaders seem to echo this message, assuring us that living with Covid-19 is a temporary inconvenience—a time of challenge that tries our patience and tests our resolve. I humbly concur with the hope that better, brighter days are ahead.

WE ARE OFFICIALLY HISTORIC!

On March 26, the Connecticut Historic Preservation Review Board approved our 60-year old building's nomination to the National Register of Historic Places! Part of the 1966 National Historic Preservation Act, the National Register recognizes resources significant to the nation's history. CMI met criteria for its association with the civil rights movement, and for architecture as a seminal example of the Mid-Twentieth-Century Modern style in religious architecture. Together with the work of famed artists like Ben Shahn, and input from Rabbi Goldburg and the congregation, German Jewish Architect Fritz Nathan's final design reflected the congregation's desire for a "temple of justice."

Beyond the honor, this listing qualifies CMI to apply for thousands of dollars from private, state and federal grants to match donations raised by our own fundraising efforts. These grants must be used exclusively for the maintenance and restoration of our building. In fact, the approval continued on page 7...

of our listing in the National Register has already enabled us to secure a \$20,000 state grant to hire a consultant to conduct a conditions assessment report to prioritize projects. We can then apply for more grants to fund long overdue maintenance issues, effectively cutting our expenditures in half. Please watch for capital campaigns to raise matching funds and ensure we stay in this unique and historic place built especially for our congregation.

Special thanks to CMI Board member, Professor Leah Glaser, who prepared the nomination with her graduate student, Elizabeth Correia. We will post the final nomination online.

RABBI HERBERT BROCKMAN TO BE HONORED AT JEWISH FAMILY SERVICE

Perhaps it was beshert that Rabbi Herbert Brockman would bring his passion for social justice to the Board of the Jewish Family Service of Greater New Haven. Brockman, who will be honored at JFS' June 17th virtual Spring Celebration, has long been dedicated to Jewish values and to the welfare of the entire community. His 2018 retirement from the pulpit at Congregation Mishkan Israel in Hamden (he is now CMI's Rabbi Emeritus) was the impetus to look for other channels through which to pursue social action. The Rabbi's long-standing priorities are a natural fit with JFS' mission of providing human and social services to the most vulnerable – without regard to race, ethnicity or religion. Amy Rashba, the agency's CEO, said, "JFS is proud to honor Rabbi Herb Brockman, whose involvement in both the Jewish and interfaith community epitomizes all that JFS stands for. With warmth, intelligence and a Jewish heart, Rabbi Brockman honors us all with his devotion to tikkun olam. He is a true mensch!"

Brockman has had a long history of social justice activism during his thirty-twoyear tenure at CMI, now carried on by his successor, Rabbi Brian Immerman. Under Brockman's leadership, the synagogue began its participation in Abraham's tent, providing shelter to homeless men; established the Peah garden to grow produce for area soup kitchens; declared itself a "sanctuary congregation" in response to the Trump administration's immigration restrictions; and became active in the Jewish Community Alliance for Refugee Resettlement. He attributes his desire to join the work of JFS to his experience searching for food for an immigrant Latino family whose father was being placed in a church sanctuary to avoid deportation. He said, "Sandy [Hagan, Food Pantry director] opened the pantry just for the family and let them 'shop.' When

the wife picked up a few items, Sandy insisted, 'That's not enough. Fill it up.' A minister who was accompanying us commented, 'Your community is amazing.' I still feel the pride I felt then. It's why I chose to join the Board of JFS and support their work."


